



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
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Taranaki Vehicle Events Trust [TVET] welcomes you to Americarna 2023.



DAVID CORNEY AND JUSTINE ALEXANDER'S

1957 Buick Caballero



Three years ago when Whanganui couple David Corney and Justine Alexander put the word out that they'd like to import a mid-1950s Buick Caballero station wagon, they didn't expect to be able to locate one right away. "There were only about 10,000 of them built in 1957 and 4500 in 1958 before Buick stopped building them, so these days they are as scarce as hen's teeth," explains Justine. "But the guy who was on the lookout for us, found one right away. It was in a farmer's barn in California, and was part of an estate sale. We couldn't believe our luck."

The 1957 model was in totally original condition too, complete with red and white paintwork, two-tone red and white vinyl upholstery, 364 cubic inch nailhead V8 and variable pitch Dynaflow automatic. All this meant that when the Caballero arrived in New Zealand there was little David and Justine needed to do, apart from changing the vehicle's wire-spoked wheels to mags because the original wheels were not suited to kiwi road conditions, and lowering the big estate slightly in the interests of better ride and handling.

The couple also gave the big Buick a bit more character by installing a vintage 1960 Atlas Woods surfboard on a roof rack, and choosing the personalised plate SUFING. They've loved the car ever since, but they've never actually used it to go surfing – the board's there for effect only.

The Caballero was Buick's most expensive station wagon of the time, and was arguably the most stylish, featuring several of the now-famous Buick design elements, including Ventiports just above the front fenders that mimic the nose of a fighter plane of the day, and the so-called Sweep Spear, a stainless steel strip that runs right down the vehicle's flanks and separates the two-tone paintwork's colours.

Unfortunately for Buick, a combination of low sales and high construction costs meant the Caballero was built for only two years before being dropped – and the Caballero name (which roughly translates to the Spanish word for Gentleman) has never been used again. But that is all good news for enthusiasts such as David and Justine, because the vehicle's rarity adds to its value and appeal.

"It's a lovely car to drive," says Justine. "You sit behind a great big white steering wheel and cruise. It was a bit of a handful before David lowered it, but now it is great. It's interesting doing a U-turn in it though," she added, referring to the vehicle's 3.1 metre wheelbase.















TUESDAY 21st FEBRUARY

Today is Registration only day. Entrants will start arriving into town, collect their Event ID/Entrant Information Folders and start getting into the Americarna groove. Our Registration Centre is based at the TSB Stadium, off Rogan Street, New Plymouth. This is also where all cruises depart from each day.

Event Merchandise is available for purchase at the TSB Stadium New Plymouth and our vendors/stalls will be open from 1:00pm – 7:30pm.

WEDNESDAY 22nd FEBRUARY

Today is the first 'official' day of Classic Cover Americarna 2023 and departure from the TSB Stadium is 10:30am. The cruise will head to Ōpunakē via Surf Highway 45. Arrival at Ōpunakē Beach is from 11:30am, where vehicles will be parked on display. While entrants lunch and enjoy the beautiful location, public are invited to view the cars.

Departure from the beach is from 2:30pm when entrants will make their way back to New Plymouth to the TSB Stadium.

Important to note: There will be a road closure in place on Beach Road, Ōpunakē, and access for Americarna vehicles only. Parking for public will be at the top of Beach Road and on the surrounding side roads. Please follow instructions from marshals to ensure you park in the correct areas.

Event merchandise is available for purchase at the TSB Stadium New Plymouth and our vendors/stalls will be open from 8:00am - 6:30pm.

THURSDAY 23rd FEBRUARY

Day 2 of Classic Cover Americarna 2023. Vehicles of those who wished to be part of the Rest Home visits will gather at the TSB Stadium. Cars will take the excited elderly for a drive around the block in cars that they may have owned back in the day.

At 12:00 noon, we depart to see the wonderful people of Waitara. Vehicles will be parked in the Waitara CBD from 12:30pm. This afternoon you can check out the cars, enjoy the local cuisine and take in the unique culture of the town.

At 3:00pm we hit the road again and head to Inglewood. The route will take us along Waitara Road and the scenic countryside. The Inglewood community is renowned for their amazing street party so if you are in the area be sure to visit to see the cars and have a great evening. There will be entertainment by Che Orton, playing some old favourites and a variety of food and refreshments will be available along with craft stalls and great entertainment for the kids. Entrants depart at 8:00pm.

Important to note: There will be road closures in place in Waitara and Inglewood. Access will be restricted in certain areas. Please be patient, take caution and follow marshall instructions.

FRIDAY 24th FEBRUARY

Day 3 of Classic Cover Americarna 2023. Departure from TSB Stadium will be 9:15am with Stratford as our first destination. The route to Stratford will see us cruising by schools. On arrival into Stratford at 9:45am, vehicles will be parked on Broadway, providing the public an opportunity to view.

At 12:45pm we cruise on to South Taranaki with Hāwera as our destination. The route to Hāwera will be via Kaponga and Manaia, again allowing more children the opportunity to enjoy the passing convoy. Upon arrival into Hāwera at 1:30pm, vehicles will be parked on High Street for public viewing.

During this time the Acceleration Event will be run on Albion Street, kicking off at 2:30pm. Be sure to be there in time to get a great spot for viewing. Please follow all marshal instructions as this is a high-risk area that requires public cooperation and caution. At 5.15pm vehicles will depart from Hāwera to head back to New Plymouth for Devon Street cruising, via the amazing Mangorei Road Street Party! Cruising ends at 9:30pm.




SATURDAY 25th FEBRUARY



Brand New Double Loop Route For 2023!

The roads are officially closed from 4:00pm with the vehicles rumbling through from approximately 6:15pm. Come into town early and secure your favourite viewing spot. We recommend the Devon Street flat between Eliot & Gover Street for great family viewing.

The convoy will return to town just before 6:00pm from South Taranaki. Vehicles will make their way to the CBD via Mangorei Road where residents will get a special first glimpse of the parade. This leg of the cruise has become an iconic part of the event that all entrants and locals look forward to!

The convoy will reach Devon Street and Hobson Street intersection where they will be directed one of two ways. Loop 1 will turn right onto Hobson, left onto Molesworth Street, left onto Egmont Street and then left onto Devon to enter the road closure. Entrants will continue up Devon Street, left onto Eliot and then left onto Molesworth to continue the loop. Loop 2 will be directed straight onto Devon Street into the road closure. This group will then turn left onto Robe Street. left onto Powderham Street/Courtenay Street, left onto Eliot Street and then left again to continue in the loop.



IMPORTANT

This new route will help with the flow of the traffic and crowd control. We ask that all public respect the liquor ban and please keep to the footpaths. Lining the road to catch a better glimpse is extremely dangerous. We have witnessed children sitting on the road side in past years and ask that all parents ensure they keep their children at a safe distance from the vehicles. The full length of the cruise route should allow plenty of space for great viewing without compromising safety. We ask the public to please respect and follow all instructions of the marshals as they have been put in place with your safety in mind.

If you are parked in the CBD on Friday afternoon, we ask that you remove your car from within the road closure by 4:00pm. The roads are officially closed from 4:00pm with the vehicles rumbling through from approximately 6:15pm. Planning, timing and cooperation are the key components that ensure this night is a success. The road will reopen at 9:30pm.

A big thank you to Centre City who are kindly keeping their carpark open until 10pm during the Friday Night Main Street Cruise. Entrances to the carpark are on St Aubyn Street (at the Wind Wand end of the Centre) and on Ariki Street (which runs into Gill Street). Please ensure you remove your car by 10pm before the carpark closes.

We would also like to give a big thank you to Venture Taranaki and TOI Foundation for their continued support to help us with costs associated with the road closures. The commitment from the business community and volunteers also contribute to this being the spectacular evening that the event has become renown for. 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Michael Blackwood's

1965 Chrysler 300



Michael went back to the man who had sold him the Chrysler - and sure enough, the car had indeed spent a large portion of its life as the museum exhibit. Not only that, he was told, the museum owner wouldn't release the vehicle until its engine, gearbox and other internals had been thoroughly checked.

"That probably explains why our Chrysler is in such great condition," he says. "It drives like a brand-new car. As a result I've done nothing to it, apart from fitting some larger exhaust tips."

Michael and his wife Majella already owned two muscle cars, a 1981 Trans Am and a 2017 wouldn't let me drive it, insisting instead on taking us for a drive. I'd like to thank him for being such an a-hole, because we turned our attention to the Chrysler 300," Michael says.

"The man selling that car was completely different. He explained the car didn't have a Warrant of Fitness, but that he would get it done right away. So we returned the following weekend, drove the car, and purchased it."

This car is a rare example of what was known as the Chrysler 300 'non-letter' series of cars, as opposed to higher-performance and more expensive 'letter series' of 300s that were built from 1955 to 1965. The non-letter series vehicles were built from 1962 to 1971, and

they became known as "bankers hot-rods".

Michael Blackwood loves driving his example, which is powered by a 383 cubic inch 6.3-litre V8 mated to a three-speed auto.

"I just cruise around in it. It stops me from driving the Challenger, which is just as well because I keep getting tickets in that one," he says.

"There's no way in the world I'll ever get rid of it," he says of the Chrysler 300 with its personalised plate DZEIER. "I've already told my wife that if we ever split up, she's not having it!"





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There's a bit of mystery surrounding Dion and Tracy Hazelwood's 1964 Pontiac Parisienne.

The Upper Hutt enthusiasts know that the Parisienne model was built in Ontario, Canada between 1958 and 1986, and that right-hand drive versions were exported in CKD packs for assembly in South Africa, Australia, and at Petone in New Zealand up until 1969.

But nobody seems to know why or how the car owned by the Hazelwoods got to New Zealand in the first place. Their research indicates that pillarless four-door versions of the Parisienne were not built at Petone, so their one must have been imported as a new car from Australia.

And it's a mystery when that happened, because registration papers show that the 1964 model was first registered in New Zealand in 1967. "We wonder if General Motors New Zealand imported the car for some reason, and then put it up for sale when the Petone factory was being closed," says Tracy Hazelwood.

"What we do know is that it was first purchased from a Christchurch dealership for \$2580, and that it remained with that owner until 2017 when it was purchased by another man. "And we also know that the day the sale went through, the original owner died."

The Hazelwoods had never owned any sort of muscle car before, but in early 2018 when they spotted the Parisienne for sale on TradeMe they were interested. "Dion liked the look of the car, and I liked its up-and-down headlights," says Tracy. So they flew to Christchurch for a viewing – and drove it home.

The Pontiac had already undergone quite an amount of restoration prior to them buying it, including replacement of the original 283 V8 with a 350 crate engine.

The Hazelwoods paid \$44,000 for the Parisienne, and since then they've spent at least a further \$60,000 getting it to its current mint condition. Work has included a transmission rebuild, a new diff, improved brakes, new power steer system, new wheels, and a lowering of the suspension.

Now, they've been thoroughly enjoying themselves attending car events throughout the lower North Island and upper South Island in their Pontiac with its distinctive blue paintwork – which is a Toyota blue, by the way. Over the past year the Hazelwoods have had their Pontiac re-upholstered by Dion Hunter of Cover Me Upholstery. And they've also fitted the car with a new personalised plate MISS64 – with the words "foot to the floor" adorning the top of the plate.

"My foot gets a little heavy when I'm driving her,"

explains Tracy. "Our Parisienne is a lovely drive though. It's a very good cruiser, turns on a dime, and overall is just a pleasure."

The couple also get a lot of pleasure from dressing up for car events – her in rock 'n roll clothes, and he more like a cowboy. They'll almost certainly be like that during Americarna, doing their bit in adding colour to an already colourful Taranaki occasion.



1956 Chevrolet Bel Air

The Chapmans also decided to honour the original owner by giving their Bel Air the personalised number plate HAZELO - the O having to be added because someone had already purchased HAZEL. And that put paid to an original plan for the plate to be 1HOT56, which is now among artwork on display in the bar at their home.

Chapmans

purchased the Chev in 2018, and when it arrived in New Zealand in October that year they were surprised to discover trophies in the trunk that the car had won at various meets in USA.

The pair also discovered that the Bel Air had a fascinating history. After the original owner had sold it to a dealer, it then became a competition prize at Cactus Pete's Resort Casino in Nevada which was celebrating its 30th anniversary. The winner was a rodding enthusiast who continued to show the car, and when he passed away it was left to his brother, also an enthusiast.

Although the car was in reasonable order, Chrissy's husband Paul Chapman did a full restoration, which included replacing the 265 Chevy motor with a 350 Chevy crate motor and a four-speed automatic with overdrive.

The Bel Air was repainted, its original yellow and black upholstery was replaced, suspension was upgraded, and power steer and power brakes were installed.


One thing the big Chevy didn't get, however, was air conditioning.

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






















After being forced to cancel Americanna 2022 it is a given we are thrilled to be able to have Americanna back for 2023.

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Don Ross had always wanted to build his own C-Cab – you know, the vehicle that's similar to a T-Bucket but with a hard top and distinctive C-shaped side windows.

"And I'd always wanted to build one from nothing," he recalls. "Then back in 2019 I was well into my 70s – and my wife Shirley told me I'd better get started, because I was running out of years!"

So he did. Don began his project with just two pieces of steel on the ground, and got stuck into designing, measuring, cutting and welding, using his many years of rodding experience to begin developing his very own motoring creation.

Once the chassis had been built from scratch, Don fitted Jaguar XJ12 front and rear suspension, then purchased a 350 Chev engine with a Powerglide two-speed automatic for use as the powerplant.

"The engine was supposed to have been fully rebuilt - however it was stuffed, so I had to do a full rebuild," he says. "I bored it out to .060, and installed a bunch of highperformance bits, which meant it ended up as a very hot 360 Chev. I also replaced the Powerglide with a rebuilt Turbo 350 with race clutches and a shift kit."

Don's C-Cab received a Jaguar limited slip differential, and the steering was of Don's very own design. Then it was time to start forming the body frame. The cowl, front and rear guards and radiator surround were all 1929 Chevrolet, and the body itself was formed out of 2.2mm glued and rivetted aluminium sheet.

After a few road tests the creation was sent to certifier Shane Speight for a final inspection, and the great news was the vehicle went straight through the certification process, then on through the WOF and Rego without any problems. Proof, says Don, of the benefits of doing things right, following the manual, and keeping in contact with your certifier.

"The satisfaction of knowing that I designed and built the entire car – nothing was out-sourced - is immense and worth all the blood, sweat and tears," he says.

Since then Don and Shirley have enjoyed more than 7000 km of trouble-free motoring in their C-Cab, and have also entered it into a few shows and rod runs – where it has won placings every time.





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
